UT OLLI SAGE and The LBJ Presidential Library Presents:




No figure looms as large in American history as the nation's president. Our schools and our political traditions teach us that these larger-than-life men – almost mythic in the power and influence they wielded – uniquely embodied their eras and shaped the country's destiny. But who are the presidents, the flesh-and-blood individuals who rose to the nation's highest office? What motivated them? How did they achieve their successes and cope with failure? How did their experiences and personalities shape their presidencies? What legacies did they leave behind?

This program will explore such questions through lively discussion with eminent presidential biographers, authors who have delved beyond the pomp and ceremony of the office to uncover the complexities and nuances of presidential lives. Each session will begin with a moderated discussion led by LBJ Library Director Mark Lawrence but will allow ample time for questions from the audience. Over six weeks, we will learn about towering figures like Thomas Jefferson and John F. Kennedy as well as lesser-known men such as John Tyler and Calvin Coolidge. And we will explore the evolution of the presidency itself, placing our own moment in the long flow of American history.

"The Eyes of Texas" - The work of "The Eyes of Texas History Committee" on the history and controversy surrounding the University of Texas school song.

In the summer of 2020, following the death of George Floyd and ensuing protests around the country, a group of committed University of Texas students thoughtfully prepared a list of demands for the university to consider in order to address racial injustice and systemic racism. In July 2020, UT President Jay Hartzell stated that "The Eyes of Texas" would remain UT's alma mater. The UT System Board of Regents supported his decision. Following this announcement, President Hartzell created the "Eyes of Texas History Committee" which had the sole authority to research and understand the song's history, as well as institutional and broader historical uses since its inception. The Committee was composed of faculty, students, alumni and historians. At the conclusion of the committee's work, a comprehensive report was produced on March 9, 2021, which included the findings of the committee and recommendations for the continued progress by UT on social issues.

On January 7th, OLLI will welcome Dr. Richard Reddick, who was Chair of the Committee, and Dr. Sharon Justice who also served on the Committee. The speakers will discuss the work of the committee, its findings, and its recommendations made to President Hartzell.


